With many years of sobriety and active involvement in general service, I've developed a profound respect for our fellowship. However, I am deeply concerned that we are failing in our primary purpose in one critical area: carrying the message in a fast-changing world.

Our society's methods of communication are evolving at a breathtaking pace. While our service structure commendably produces new literature, these efforts are undermined if the message doesn't reach the alcoholic who needs it. When it comes to delivering our message through modern channels, I would have to give A.A. a failing grade. We are consistently absent from new platforms as they emerge, leaving a vacuum filled by well-meaning but often inaccurate voices.

The root of this problem lies in our decision-making process. We believe every new communication tool requires the slow, deliberate consensus of the entire fellowship. By the time we finish debating the merits of a new channel, it's already becoming obsolete.

Consider this analogy: A 12th-step call comes in. Two members are ready to go, but they stop to debate which car to take—the gas or the electric. They form a committee. By the time they reach a decision, a hydrogen-powered car is now an option, and the debate begins anew. All the while, an alcoholic is dying.

We don't form committees to choose the paper weight or ink color for a new printing of the Big Book; we trust our servants to handle it. Why is digital distribution treated with such debilitating indecision?

The solution, though challenging, is clear: We must empower trusted servants, those with the right skills, to make timely decisions about our digital outreach. Their efforts won't always be perfect in a landscape that's a moving target. But when an attempt fails, it should be seen not as a catastrophe, but as an opportunity to learn and adapt.

This is the true spirit of Bill Wilson's words, "Sometimes the good is the enemy of the best." This quote is often misused to justify inaction after a setback. Instead, it should motivate us to relentlessly pursue the *next* best way, to keep learning, and to ensure we are doing everything possible to carry the message to those who still suffer. Let's stop debating the delivery method and simply deliver the message by every means at our disposal.

Happy Birthday to Us! 90 Years this month on the 10th!! It's called "Founders Day" for those who don't know.

We have a couple potluck/barbeque type events here in Yakima and I'm sure many more scattered across the expanse of Area 92. Good on you all! In addition I'm looking forward to attending the service celebration later this month in Walla Walla. Look on the Area Calendar for details.

It's been fairly quiet most recently but things are about to speed up as preparations for the 2025 International Convention in "Beautiful British Columbia", Vancouver, Canada are now on final approach.

First, our service workshop here in Yakima came off smoothly if the attendance was a bit disappointing. There were however enough attendees new to service (and these are definitely the people we do this for) that I feel it wasn't just us service minded people "preaching to the choir". In fact we filled at least a couple positions as a result. One at Area and another here in District 6.

Just last Saturday Marty from Vancouver BC visited Yakima for a workshop on the "physiology" of alcoholism. Hope I got that right. I had traveled all the way to Winthrop hoping to hear him at the recent Okanogan Valley Roundup but he was sick and sent an underling named Jeff who filled in nicely, but it was good to hear Marty again and I'm looking forward to sharing Vancouver with him and around 50-70K other alcoholics in a few weeks. The spectacle is unforgettable and one that I highly recommend! Taking over and loving a large city with miracles from all across the globe wearing lanyards and name tags!

If you're not going this time just know there is five years to plan for the next 2030 International in St Louis, which coincidentally was the site for the very first National Corrections Conference (NCC) in 2015. There will be only a couple state borders to cross this time and no one cares much about past drunk driving offenses. It's easier.

I have been occupied primarily with the archives display I've been asked to compile for the NCC Hospitality Suite and I'm not done yet. I am resigned to just doing the best I can at this, not being any kind of trained archivist, plus the fact that only about 3 of the 7 NCC events have really provided much useful archival stuff, albeit what I have is pretty interesting and presentable. I'm not going to be alone and it's not the whole of the hospitality suite. I'll just have to start from where I'm at.

On another note, more recently Patrick, the International Committee Chair contacted me requesting that I chair the International meeting: "Virtual AA, Are We Hiding Behind Our Screens" at the Convention Center on Friday. I only have a few details and don't yet know who the other 3 presenters will be. If anyone is interested in attending (I know I am, LOL) it's

11am-12:30pm and I expect it will be presented virtually. I'm excited, not only that I am asked to do this but with a topic I am personally very invested in as well.

Shifting gears to Eastern State: We have been given a green light to begin meetings there and our committee is scheduled to do a first walkthrough and sit down with the staff this coming Thursday June 5. I'm hoping we will come away with enough of the details to begin regular AA meetings there shortly. We have assembled an initial committee and my sponsor Dave W, an oldtimer with many years experience in the treatment industry as an executive director has agreed to head this up. He needed something to do as he spends too much time golfing now that he is retired (he might not agree with me on that) and so he accepted my invitation and the approval of the committee as the first committee chair (not sure what title he will be given, hopefully they will choose something entertaining).

While this is an institutional meeting it has not been connected to one of our committees. It existed before the pandemic but it just seems like we should have a specific committee for oversight, for example there will be a need for at least some kind of support literature. This can all be decided later, we're back in the door, Yay!

As a reminder any who are interested or may know someone we are seeking volunteers (I expect mostly from the Spokane area as the facility is in Medical Lake) to volunteer at this new facility. Please contact me (or if you already know someone) and I'll put you in contact with the committee.

Regarding our NCC bid committee (for November 2027) and the upcoming event in Nashville this November: Several of our committee (including from Area 72) did a planned guided walkthrough of facilities in Tri-Cities and we are all excited at the outcome, the facilities are top notch. More details later but we will have a nice group of attendees from Area 72 and Area 92 that includes in addition to myself A72 Chair Derek S, corrections chairs from both A72 and A92, Aimee and Dale, and several others from our joint (A72 and A92) committee. I'm gratified at this support, and excited to put our best foot forward to bring this event to Tri-Cities in November of 2027.

As a reminder an original purpose of the National Corrections Conference is to foster volunteerism and one big reason I am so invested in bringing the event to Eastern Washington and Washington State Penitentiary. It will increase volunteer participation and our corrections effort in general. One obvious result of our efforts is that people we may never meet will find sobriety.

Lastly we are gearing up for our July Quarterly in Ellensburg. Please come join us in person if you can, or virtually as we will offer hybrid.

Greetings from your Area 92 Treasurer. What a blessing it has been to have Anna V. join the Area Committee as our new Alternate Treasurer. I gained a great appreciation for the responsibilities of her position while filling in. Anna is a quick learner and is doing a fabulous job! She hasn't missed a step, as though she's been doing it all along!

I took the week of Memorial Day off to relax and decompress with family and friends after a very busy, whirlwind of a first Quarter. Feeling refreshed and rejuvenated I am back at my desk, focused on accomplishing my remaining goals for this rotation.

The financial report for June follows, reflecting net income for the month of \$2707.39. Still, contributions are substantially less than our monthly budgeted amount needed to meet expenses. And five months into the year our Area finances are operating at a year-to-date net loss of \$3645.12 as of May 30th. In May we received only one 995 challenge contribution of \$9.95. Year to date through May 30th contributions to the \$9.95 challenge total \$357.25. Five months into the year and we are only at .029% of our goal for the year of \$12,000.00. We can do better! Let's Rock and Roll! Inspire your fellow members to be part of the solution for the still suffering alcoholic, by contributing one time per year \$9.95 Seventh Tradition contribution in celebration and gratitude of the 90th birthday of the program that saved our lives and the 30th birthday of WA STATE EAST AREA 92!

In closing I want to thank the groups and Districts who contribute, and thanks to Yakima for your large contribution of \$1,006.00. Also, a special thank you to the individual members who contribute directly to Area 92, particularly those who have set up automatic monthly bank transfers through our PayPal account!



It was the September 1957 quarterly issue, Volume VII number 3 of a publication called "Pioneer". It was a publication straight from our own Walla Walla Washington State Penitentiary's Pioneer Group meeting! This is the first time pretty much all of us had ever heard of these printings. So, it just struck me as fitting, that as our Grapevine has its moment this month to spotlight AA's works in Corrections, I would share with our Area 92 some fabulous highlights of our own Area's work in Corrections from 68 years ago! I share with you an excerpt of what kind of activity level the Pioneer Group had back in 1957, and how remarkably it reflects what still goes on today! Please enjoy...

Words of Wisdom Spark Session

Speakers Impressed Listeners with Sincerity

More than 65 outside AA members from throughout the Northwest and Canada were guests of Pioneer Group inside walls of the state penitentiary at Walla Walla August 10th for the Eighth Annual Conference of the group. More than 200 inmates participated with guests in the full afternoon of AA which was sparked by speeches judged among best ever heard here at AA sessions.

Superintendent Bob Rhay opened the first session of the afternoon with the welcome for the guests. He said the AA program as operating now in the prison is one of the foremost methods for the individual to help himself with a problem which has grown proportionately with the state's population. He called on members to continue to support the program here and complimented present members on the sincere attitude and therapy classes being conducted.

Henry C., co-chairman for the first session, and Harold H., group secretary and co-chairman, alternated and introducing speakers from outside groups and the inmate membership. Emphasis was placed on spiritual sobriety as well as physical sobriety by many speakers. Analysis of the AA program and its philosophy was also subject material covered by the speakers. It was pointed out little mention of personal histories cropped up in the speeches as the men concentrated on bringing interpretations of the general program into focus for listeners. Termed one of the most successful conferences in the Pioneer group's history, the sessions featured an hour-long intermission when inmates and guests mingled during a "box lunch social." The lunch consisted of sandwiches, cake, potato salad, olives and pickles with plenty of coffee and orangeade.

Following the first half, which was a two-hour session followed by the lunch hour, Al S., Seattle, and Walter N., inmate co-chairman, alternated in again introducing speakers from groups throughout the Northwest and from Pioneer groups one and two.

The session continued until shortly after 6 PM when the conference was closed as some 300 in attendance rose to recite the Lord's prayer in unison.

Nearly every outside speaker emphasized the worth of studying the spiritual side of the program and incorporating it into any serious effort in the AA way of life. Frank H., from Everett, reminded the audience of inmates that while society may have exacted a penalty for a crime, the same society doesn't owe the man coming from prison "anything." He said the outgoing inmate should be prepared to face the world and its problems on his own feet and not feel AA is going to furnish an easy way out. He pointed out too, Alcoholics coming from prison who separate themselves from the AA program soon returned to prison as violators because of another drinking bout.

However, he said AA can and does help each inmate as he goes back to resume a life in society. He pointed out that telling a group about personal history such as a felony conviction is not necessary. Only admittance of alcoholism and a desire to arrest alcoholism is the requirement. Other personal data is not up for debate, he said.

Rick S., Pendleton, said each member should take an inventory to see how he "measures up" to the AA program. "It isn't only a matter of working the program," he said, "but also a matter of how a member feels he can work the program.

The Pendleton AA'er who held his audience with "visual aids" of a six-foot ruler and a lemon closed his speech with a parallel. Holding the lemon aloft, he said, "I used to resemble this. My entire life was a lemon, and I couldn't use it. Now I've taken that same lemon of a life and I enjoy the lemonade I have made with it."

Less V., Seattle, reiterated the claim of nearly every AA member from outside, telling the audience he received more from attending meetings at the prison than any other AA work he does. Al S., co-chairman, also said the bi-monthly visits from groups from throughout the state to the prison brought better understanding of the program and its 12-step work to inmates.

Following the afternoon conference, the Walla Walla AA group invited conference guests to attend an open-air meeting at a park where a "pot-luck" dinner was given.

Members of the Pioneer group were complimented on smoothness of operation for the conference by both guests and officials of the institution who hailed the annual get together as the best in a long line of success for the group.







